

Roy was the very First Vice President of Rotary International and later became the founder and the first President of the Rotary Club of Seattle in 1909. His business career took him to the Rotary Club of San Diego and upon his retirement, he and Melcena moved to our area.

District Governor Claud Black appointed Roy Denny as his "Ambassador" and Roy appeared before many Clubs in Southern California and Nevada on behalf of the District Governor and Rotary International.

Roy believed that the goal of a philosophical life cannot be formulated as a state of being which is attainable and once attained, perfect. He felt that to learn how to live and to learn how to die are philosophically one and the same.

The members of San Marino and throughout our Rotary District have greatly benefited from the leadership and qualities which past Rotary International Vice President Roy exemplified.
